Our summer in the formation and care ministry cluster has been active and exciting.

In June, a number of our high school students met for a day-long training to begin Peer Ministry. We gathered to learn about a variety of ways in which we can do

ministry among one another. We will carry this into fall and throughout the year to foster and grow deeper relationships with our students.

Then, in July, 25 of our middle and high school students trekked north to Camp Amnicon for a week of experiential learning. At Camp Amnicon, we stretched our minds, our bodies and our spirits—putting many of the lessons of our program year to use in real life situations.

Throughout the summer, our Sunday school students met for Vacation Bible School on Sunday mornings. We learned Jesus' command for us to love and serve our neighbors locally, globally and environmentally.

And, we have cared for our friends and members by making phone calls, regular pastor visits, Caring Crew visits and sending notes, cards, worship materials and devotional materials to our homebound.

The Spirit is at work here at Central and now we look with excitement and wonder to the program year ahead

where our theme for the year is "Open to the Mystery of God."

With each program launch, from Sunday school to the adult forums, we will talk about and explore who God is and what God is up to in the world. All we do in education, worship, community and generosity leads us back to this Triune God—Father, Son and Spirit—who in their own relational identity, connects us to each other and to the cosmos. How do we understand God's presence in the context of our work, our play, our neighborhoods and our environment? We will dig deeply into these areas and explore how we see God at work in all things.

Children, Youth and Family programming begins on "God's work. Our hands." Sunday—September 8. In addition to classroom experience this year, individual grade levels will experience Ministry Stepping Stones. These stepping stones encourage families to gather and celebrate faith development with their child by attending specialized and age-appropriate lessons that goes beyond their Sunday morning learning. More details will be coming on this exciting addition to our programming.

Sunday school and confirmation classes will begin in one big opening experience in the largest Sunday school room called Transfiguration on September 8 at 9:30 a.m. Parents and children are expected to attend together to learn about the program year. Sunday school and confirmation classes will actually begin on September 15 at 9:30 a.m. The high school youth group will begin on September 15 at 9:30 a.m. also.

In addition to great learning and formation, we continue to provide compassionate care to our members and friends across the Twin Cities. Our great team of Caring Crew participants extends our love and care to members from Woodbury to Monticello and from New Brighton to Lakeville. We would love to have you join our outreach, so if you are outgoing and interested in visiting some of our members in their homes, contact Pastor Stephanie.

Open to the Mystery of God

Being open is one of the essentials for a life of faith in today's complex world. It is a gift to be open to God and it is a gift to be open to one another. Open to God we become listeners for God's gracious invitations for our lives. Open to one another we become listeners to one another's stories. Open to God and to one another we enter the place of mystery. In that place of mystery, questions shape who we are and invite us to the place of vulnerability. One of the greatest questions that we begin with when we are open to the mystery of God is: who is God? From that question, other questions open us to the mystery and to lives of faith, love, hope, justice and peace.

Who is God?

This question opens us to God, an awareness of God's abiding and continual love. It invites our contemplation and certainly our welcome reflections. Who is God? This is also a question that opens us to one another. Who is God for you? How do you experience God? What does God care about and call us to be about?

At the center of the question is the promise that all belong to God, and are free to ask the questions. In the asking, we experience God, learn about who we are and what God is calling us to join for a world grounded in love, justice and peace.

For this program year, from September – May, the invitation to be open to the mystery of God will help shape worship, faith formation, community life and generosity. For adult life long faith formation, it is an exceptional invitation to help us grow in an awareness of God, one another and our relationships with all our neighbors.

Toes Pointed Out – The Fall Capital Appeal

One year ago, we were almost ready to move into the new, mission-forward facility. Now we wonder how we engaged in ministry and mission without the new facility. We dedicated the new facility to the glory of God on the first weekend in October. Since then we have gathered for worship and the fellowship that follows each of the four worship services.

The new commercial kitchen has been a blessing for congregational meals, community gatherings, funerals, weddings and all the ways we gather to break bread on a daily basis.

Mission Forward

The great room draws us in as we gather for worship. We gather after each service to connect and celebrate this life together. Whether we consciously notice it or not, when we gather in the great room we are always looking out into God's world. We are looking out on a world in need, into a neighborhood and the community where God has planted us to grow and serve.

The Sunday school spaces will buzz with energy soon, once again sharing the space with the Free Store and Augsburg Central Health Commons. This summer a member of the community commented that she loved that on Sunday the little children are welcomed by Jesus to learn and grow and on Monday God's children of all ages are welcomed by Jesus to learn and grow. There are logistics to tend to, but

what a gift that each space is shared for such vibrant and meaningful ministries.

For many years our focus has been inward, by God's call and missional necessity. As Mark Bernhardson, co-chair of the Strategic Planning Team reminds us, there are times when our toes are pointing inward for needed work, but, eventually our toes all need to be pointed outward in mission and ministry. With the many details that demanded an inward focus now complete, it is time for our toes to be pointed outward. After all, it is hard to be mission forward, to move into the future as a congregation if our toes are pointed inward. When any of us set out on a walk, we point our toes in the direction we want to go, and then move forward.

It is time to be mission forward. With that call, it is time for the second capital appeal we committed to as a congregation when we launched the Building Renewal Project. This fall we will be led by our Kairos consultants, Tom Jolivette and Kristin Wiersma, in our capital appeal. There will be focus group opportunities, gatherings, communications about the appeal, and most importantly, invitations to prayer and deep listening to God. Watch for these invitations in the *Spirit*, in your email inbox and your home mailbox. The Celebration Weekend will be on Saturday, November 23, Sunday, November 24 and Monday, November 25. Save this weekend and plan to be in worship as we set our toes facing outward for mission forward.

Strategic Planning Process and the MAP Survey Results

The MAP survey that we had the chance to take earlier this summer provided valuable insights for the Strategic Planning Team. It affirmed

many of the goals that are needed to address God's call for a deepening of ministry and mission. The Strategic Planning Team has formed strategic goals and will pass them along to the Council for adoption. This will launch new task force work and initiatives for our life together. Once these are adopted by the Council, the goals will be shared in the *Spirit* and through other communication methods. A leadership team of the vice-president, the past 10 presidents of

the congregation and members of the Strategic Planning Team will be charged with tending the vision and seeing that the work continues on the mission and ministry goals. It is exciting to be mission forward, gathering in God's presence so that we can be sent out into the world with the good news of God's love, peace, justice and hope.


Please keep Anna and Zach and the other 63 YAGMs in your prayers as they leave for an 8-day orientation in Chicago and then fly to their posts.

In the Gutter

If you're a regular worshipper at Central—especially if you attend the 10:30 worship service —you likely are familiar with the "gutters" that appear at the margins of nearly every page in our worship folders. In addition to graphics and some explanations regarding the day's scripture readings, we use these margins as a means of explaining what's going on in our services. For example, you may see a "blurb" (as we in the office call them) about a specific piece of the spoken liturgy. There may also be some information about a hymn or piece of music that hopefully gives you, the worshipper, a little more insight and understanding

into why these specific pieces were chosen and how they fit into the day's service. It's interesting that, over the past few years, many congregations all over the United States have inquired about our worship folders and have copied the style. The fact that all

our worship folders are published on our website also has had an impact. People pay attention to what is going on here at Central!


Worship is a tapestry, woven together to form a continuous whole that makes sense—that picks up the theme for any given Sunday or festival day and literally spins it out in word, prayer and music. There are often threads of recurring colors—something at the end of the service may call to mind something that was spoken or sung at the beginning. Some of this may be musical; even the hint of the melody from our opening hymn showing up again in an organ or piano meditation during

communion distribution. Worship is also drama. Central is telling the story through the texts and the sermon and the reenactment of the Lord's Supper. As Lutherans, we gather weekly around Word and Sacrament. Our gutter notes are aimed to make our services more meaningful for those who attend. In "liturgical" traditions (Lutheran, Episcopalian and Roman Catholic), when certain parts of the liturgy recur weekly by design, there is always a danger in these becoming empty—simply doing them because they've always been done resulting in a loss of meaning. Why do we do what we do? Why do we say what we say? "The Lord be with you.

And also with you." Why? Our gutter notes help this.

This coming fall we'll strive to be even more intentional in helping worshippers understand our incredible, beautiful Lutheran traditions—our

meaningful liturgical structures, our musical heritage(s)—we'll try to do this for all our services. It may mean reformatting some of our publications or producing brief summaries of our service structures that will be placed in our pews hymnal racks. Worship/liturgy is formation. What we hear, what we say, what we sing in the context of our time together in our sanctuary has an imprint on who we are and on how we interact with the world. It's so worth it!



Contemplation and Action

If you need more contemplation, consider joining us the weekend of September 7-9 after the Saturday night worship service, after the 10:30 Sunday morning worship service, and after the 11:00 Monday worship service for prayer walks around our neighborhood. Eat lunch first, prayerfully walk the streets and skyways, and return to reflect. It might give you a new way to engage your neighborhood too.

Formation is for all of us, all the time. We are never done learning and balancing and reengaging.
