Casavant Organ Project

The Casavant Organ design process continues. The team at Richards/Fowkes is currently laying out the new windchests, and beginning to design the movable console.

Much of the organ has now been rendered in 3D, allowing for a high degree of precision.

Throughout the first few months of the year (roughly January through early April), extreme dryness silenced significant sections of the organ. Cracks along glue joints separated significantly, allowing pressurized air to escape. With more humidity, those problems have mostly gone a

those problems have mostly gone away, although a few residual dead notes remain. The glue joints are still separated, but the gaps have (for the most part) closed up sufficiently to contain the pressurized air.

During the summer, we expect to have more educational opportunities to learn about the organ, how it works, and the work to be done on it. Stay tuned for details on these dates.

Sanctuary Renewal Team update

Along with the work to restore the Casavant organ, there will be recommendations for work related to the sanctuary and facility. This work is gathered under the term "Sanctuary Renewal." The initial list of projects for the sanctuary renewal (while not exhaustive) may include sanctuary boiler/ heating plant replacement, parking lot re-milling and repair, sanctuary ADA work, sacristy

remodel, sanctuary exterior tuck-pointing/ mason work, woodwork repair, and longterm maintenance planning. The Fiscal and Property Committee and council have appointed these members to serve as the

Summer Building Projects

Last summer we experienced two severe weather moments that damaged the facility: a hail storm and then a lightening strike. The insurance company has settled the claim and provided the funds for a full replacement of the roof on the new addition. This significant project will begin in early August and will take 2-3 months to complete.

The lightning claim was also settled, the parts ordered and the work to replace the bell tower lighting and other damaged electronic equipment is underway or is planned for this summer. Watch the *Spirit* for updates on this and other summer repairs that are planned for the facility.



Legislative Update

the summer months.

We have been focused on three bills this legislative session: The Bridge to Shelter Act, The Bill of Rights for People Utilizing Shelter,

and the Constitutional Amendment for Housing.

The first bill provides
Hennepin County and a
few other communities
in the state funding to
help them keep open
good programs that had
been started with federal
COVID Relief Funds. That

bill has not moved forward. Stay tuned for more info as we work to secure funding.

The Bill of Rights for People Utilizing Shelter did not get a hearing in a committee before the March deadline, so it will not be moved forward this session. Our hope is to spend the summer editing the bill for more accountability and reaching out to

> legislators to add their names as authors, building a base amongst the committee chairs we will need next session.

Finally, the Constitutional Amendment for Housing bill will not be moving forward this session. The coalition who is championing this bill has decided it would be a much better idea for this to appear on the statewide ballot in 2026 and are working to that end.

Align Summer Campaign

Align Minneapolis is the coalition of congregations Central belongs to that works to end homelessness together. The organizing team of Align provides focus for us three times a year and, for this spring, we are trying to pull apart the complexity of the system that homeless folks face when they are no longer housed. There are a lot of layers of bureaucracy and safety nets and acronyms to navigate when you need help. The insider language is enough to keep people from getting what they need. Even knowing what some of these terms mean or what the processes are, can help all of us understand better what it is like to be someone without a home.

From the Spring campaign guide from Align:

When an adult (without minor children) is experiencing homelessness and wants to access shelter their first call will be to the Hennepin Shelter Hotline at 612-204-8200. The Hennepin Shelter Hotline is run by Catholic Charities and includes what is called "diversion," meaning helping people to explore a variety of places they might be able to stay without entering the shelter system. This might mean helping the person provide money to stay with a relative, providing a bus ticket to get back to their home, or mediating between them and a friend they have been staying with. When diversion is not possible, the person will be connected to the Adult Shelter Connect (ASC) line, which is run by Simpson Housing Services (under contract with Hennepin County). Adult Shelter Connect is primarily accessed by phone; when a person speaks with ASC they can request a bed at a shelter, and can express preference for which shelter, though beds are not always available at all shelters. People accessing shelter have to call Adult Shelter Connect daily to make their reservation. If a reservation is not made or unavailable during the day, a person can call back later at night to see if any beds have opened up. The uncertainty of when one will be staying each night is incredibly stressful. Barriers to accessing shelter include not having access to a phone (publicly available phones are very limited), and not calling when shelter beds are still available. Additionally, shelters can and do fill up and there are times when there are no shelter beds available.

Giving Thanks for Leadership

Central's Congregation Council works with members, volunteers, and staff to imagine and implement the church's mission, vision, and goals.

rom its inception, Central has a history of service and meeting the needs of the time. So, in that spirit, the Congregation Council has been in thoughtful conversation and active listening to consider how we meet the needs of this particular time.

"One Community," continues to guide the congregation and council in the values we share and the work we do here.

I am honored to have assumed the role as congregation president this year. Since joining Central in 2001, I have had the opportunity to serve on a number of ministry teams, such as the New Members, Hospitality, Nominating, and Call committees, communion assistant, and now on council. Within each team, I have experienced connection and the welcoming spirit that is exhibited here so well.

Council began the discussion around

"belonging" in 2020 as the COVID-19 pandemic descended upon us. Being part of a community took on new meaning as so many felt the effects of isolation. These early conversations and the pandemic helped shape the next step. In 2022 the council hosted

Central's Congregation Council at the April 2024 meeting (missing is Karl Starr and Julie Anderson).

"Advocating and Walking With" small group congregational meetings, with a focus on listening for God's call for those in need.

In 2023, the council held one-on-one conversations with Central members asking three questions:

- 1. How do you experience Central?
- 2. How do you describe the Central community?
- 3. What are your hopes for the Central community?

From these conversations, a list was compiled of the themes we heard that reflect the values of the congregation. Some of the themes include: welcoming, acceptance, inclusivity, hospitality, worship and music, a place for all seasons, young adults, and yonnection.

The focus for council in 2024 is continuing the conversation and listening for one or two emerging themes. As we enter a time of discernment, we are committed to leaning into our strengths and values which will lead to action. Service is embedded in Central;

> the council's goal is to build on that and adopt achievable projects for our strategic plan.

> In John 15, Jesus tells us that he is the vine and we are the branches. As Pastor Stephanie reminded us in her sermon on Confirmation Sunday, that as branches and leaves on the vine, we abide with God and we abide with each other, too.

Please keep the council in your prayers as we continue this work and that we are open to the undiscovered possibilities.

Summer. It's the season when faith formation takes flight and leaves the building. It's the

season when children and youth move beyond classrooms and into the world where experience is the teacher. The Spirit moves children and youth into stadiums and parks, mountains and water ways. Some travel to share music and theater: some seek wilderness adventures; others gather in stadiums to learn, worship and offer praise. Whatever the experience, summer is the time of experiential and high impact learning.

The cadence of summer learning here at Central is to offer a variety of experiences to our kids. Starting as young as three, the Sunday school children learn of God's work in the world through Vacation Bible School (offered every summer, one Sunday each month) for an extended learning time. Kids

arrive to a room filled with hoolahoops, beach balls, and summer fun, to a more relaxed atmosphere where hands-on learning centers on God, creation, loving our neighbors, and living like Jesus.

This year, the focus will be on the story of The Good Samaritan. We will explore our neighbors through a global lens, learning to love the neighbors we cannot see. Understanding different cultures through food, clothing and activities, kids will learn to love their neighbors near and far.

Amnicon is an anchor activity for kids at Central. Each summer, the middle school

with friends. Under the supervision of adult guides from church and remarkable youth from Amnicon, students learn to trust each other and grow in their relationships with friends from Central.

At Amnicon, our kids learn that they are strong and capable. Marlee Baron writes,

small, and in turn, they build confidence and perseverance.

At the high school level, students rotate summer experiences in a three-year cycle.

The ELCA hosts an event for high school students every three years for kids to gather with others from ELCA churches around the world in a mass gathering. The gatherings rotate to different cities which in the past 10

years have included Detroit, Houston, and New Orleans. This event is designed to empower and embolden students to look with wide eyes at the work of the church on a grand scale. Kids attend evening events with tens of thousands of other students from around the country for music

and inspiring speakers. During the day, we celebrate with other churches from our home synods, offer a full day of service to support the host city and we learn and play in an interactive learning center put together by the ELCA and its partners. The ELCA National Youth Gathering is an amazing opportunity for the kids to see the depth and breadth of the church throughout the world. Emmie Brenke says, "Summer trips with Central have always made me feel part of something

bigger, whether that's in my community or in the spaces we're in."

Another rotation in the three-year cycle is often a trip to Christikon, an ELCA camp that sits in the Absaroka Mountains just south and west of Billings, Montana. Nestled on the banks of the Boulder River, time at Christikon is punctuated by six days of mountain experiences that include hiking, learning, worshipping and connecting. In a truly

breathtaking environment, the days at Christikon offer a break from the noise of everyday living. We worship each morning with guitars and student leaders who offer new and fresh insights on what it means to be a Christian here and now.

In the third year of the cycle, we consider a trip back to Amnicon or a learning trip. Our hope is to take a Civil Rights Tour to Birmingham, Selma, and Memphis, a trip that was planned and scheduled for 2020, but was cancelled due to COVID-19.

The students at Central are blessed by the generosity of this congregation and its many ministry partners. Stay tuned for stories from this year's summer adventures!
