Mary goes to see her cousin Elizabeth, and when the child leaps in her womb, Mary sings her song, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my savior." We know her song as the Magnificat, an expansive song of praise, memory, mercy, and justice.

This Advent and Christmas season we will dwell in the wonder of Mary's yes and in the songs we sing. The question is yours to ponder: where is God asking for your "yes?" After you respond to God's invitation, what are the songs you sing? Are they songs of hope, prayer, memory, longing, or wonder? Are there favorite hymns that ground you throughout the year? Are there favorite Advent and Christmas hymns that you look forward to singing this season?

For me, Angels we Have Heard on High captures the wonder of Mary's yes and the joy of heaven:

Angels we have heard on high,
sweetly singing o'er the plains,
and the mountains in reply,
echoing their joyous strains.
Gloria in excelsis Deo;
gloria in excelsis Deo.

"The question is yours to ponder: Where is God asking for your 'yes?'"

I know that I just gave you an earworm song for this moment. Enjoy singing as you give thanks for Mary's yes and all the ways we sing our shared songs of faith.

Casavant Organ Update

The design phase of the Casavant Organ project is nearly completed. One year ago, the congregation voted to authorize the design phase of this project, and work began in January 2024. We expect to receive these designs in January 2025. The next step will be to enter the construction phase of the project, which will be much longer. We will have an update about this at the annual meeting in February. In the meantime, we have released several videos about how the organ works, and the issues we will be addressing in this project. Those can be found on Central's website.

In regard to the current state of the organ: this summer saw significant deterioration of the 1980s-era electrical system. This has silenced 10 different stops (which is about 15% of the instrument). As of this writing, the organ has

not yet been significantly affected by winter dryness this season. However, as the weather gets colder, we expect to see more of the organ become unusable for the duration of winter, as has happened in previous years. As always, we are constantly working around these issues so that our musical life together can continue, but it's important to remember that they are ever-present nonetheless.

rief is a common human experience. At some point in our lives, we will all experience the loss of a loved one. Coming to grips with our grief and living through it into a new life without the physical presence of our loved one(s) is challenging. The experience of grief is both universal and unique; we all feel a vast array of emotions

but the when, where, and why of facing them is wholly our own. Grief can be isolating.

Often, when we feel isolated by our grief, we can find ourselves turning to unhealthy coping mechanisms, causing harm to ourselves and those around us. In her article "The Importance of Community in Overcoming Grief," family grief counselor Jill Cohen emphasizes how important it is to find your community during the grief process. She makes known that, "Social workers find that it's important, whether it be your family, friends, loved

ones, or even your pets, to create a support system, to keep you grounded and help you process and understand what you're feeling."

The church community at Central strives to offer spaces where individual and collective grief can be expressed, shared, and supported by the pastors and others in our church family. The Grief Support Group meets monthly on the fourth Wednesday at 1 p.m. for this purpose. Annually, on All Saints' Weekend, we light candles together and say the names of our beloved saints who died during that year. And, several times over the course of the last year, we have offered special

Healing Prayer Services.

Beginning with a Blue Christmas service last year in 2023, Central's Prayer Ministry Team, supported by the pastors, have held four such services over the course of the year. Each service was themed around a specific kind of event that causes grief. In February, we gathered for a healing prayer service for those dealing with cancer or illness. In April, we held a service for those who have experienced the loss of a child in their lives. And in October, the healing prayer service focused on those with memory loss issues and their caregivers.

So, how did the Prayer Team identify the congregation's needs for healing prayer? Pastor Stephanie explains, "We tend to the needs of the congregation in a collaborative effort between church leaders and the prayer team. Through pastoral care conversations,

we have an awareness of people's deep need for care and compassion."

These healing prayer services are significant for those who have experienced grief.

The Loss of a Child service was especially meaningful for Bobbie Spradley who shares that she was "especially comforted to share with one of the pastors that I have a daughter

who is estranged from me and all my family. I shared the pain and loss I feel with that separation, and we prayed together for her and my family."

Healing Prayer Services aren't new to Central. Bonnie Weisenburger recalls that, "Healing prayers have been practiced at Central for a

long, long time. From what I remember, it started with Pastor Dick Beckmen, who was instrumental in starting the Order of St. Luke, a healing ministry, here at Central. When he retired, the ministry sort of folded, so I am so glad that we have healing prayers here once again."

This time of year (Advent and Christmas), the mood around us is often busy and cheerful and very focused on making happy memories with family. For someone in the grieving process, this time of year can be especially tough. You don't want to be the downer in the room when everyone else is celebrating, but inside you're experiencing all the difficult emotions of grief as you miss your loved one(s). And so, we've worked to create a space for that grief in this season of anticipation and joy.

Central will again host a Blue Christmas Healing Prayer Service on Saturday, December 14 at 5 p.m. Long-time Prayer Team member, Marie Wiegert, describes Blue Christmas as being, "especially important as a Healing Prayer service [because it is] a safe

service for grief, loss, and loneliness. The Scripture and hymns are chosen to provide an opportunity for comfort and encouragement."

Please consider joining us for Blue Christmas Healing Prayer service this year, wherever you are on your grief journey. As Pastor Stephanie reminds us: "Healing services are essential in our shared lives because some of the most important work we do is anchored in caring for one another. Especially at Christmas."

Strategic Plan Task Forces

The Congregation Council has created three strategic task forces after an intentional time of listening for God. The listening process began during the COVID-19 pandemic. The Executive Committee initiated a process for the council to reflect on God's call and strategic possibilities for this faith community. As we emerged from the pandemic, the

council continued the process of listening and learning. The categories that have emerged flow from the early Covid council conversations, guest speakers, the fall 2023 one-on-one conversation process, and the recent work of the council.

Three task forces were created:

- 1. Connections, Invitations, and Communications (ICC) Task Force: This task force will seek to build connections for all. There will be an emphasis on communication and invitations for people to share their gifts at church and in daily life.
- 2. Seasons of Life Task Force: This task force will seek to engage each demographic age group, working to provide invitations and offerings for deepened faith growth, care, and support in each season of life.

3. Mental Health and Wholeness Task Force: This task force will seek to enhance support for the mental health needs of our community by exploring options for education, staffing, and community partnerships.

Website Update and Invitation

Central Director of Communications, Brenda Blackhawk, and the Website Redesign Team have been hard at work in 2024 designing a new website for the church. With input from the pastors and staff, they identified goals, developed design layouts, and collected, sorted, and edited content and images for the new website.

Now, those elements have been handed over to the website developers at Sprung. We hope to unveil the new website by the annual

meeting in February.
