Examen: prayer-filled mindfulness

We are busy people. I say we because I have yet to meet someone who has their life in perfect balance of rest and work and play. If you have achieved this, please send along your tips and tricks! There are times when I am drifting off to sleep that I suddenly remember something I had forgotten until that moment, or I wake in the middle of the night because I forgot to put out the recycling or sign that permission slip for one of the kids. Other times I remember a word I said or a choice I made and

rehearse it over and over for how I could have been kinder

or more patient.

This Lent we are spending time with St. Ignatius of Loyola's Examen prayer. He encouraged prayer-filled mindfulness, and his Examen prayer was one way of reflecting back on one's day and being able to listen to God's presence and to discern God's direction for us. At one point he suggested that twice a day (at noon and before sleep) people should work through these five invitations:

- 1. Ask God for light/illumination
- 2. Give thanks
- 3. Review the day
- 4. Face your shortcomings/limitations
- 5. Look forward to the day to come

Prepare for 2024 Legislative Session

This year, the state legislature is scheduled to convene on February 12, 2024, and adjourn on May 20, 2024. As we begin to prepare for the session, we encourage you to take the following four steps:

1. Find out who your state legislators are

If you don't already know who your State Senator and State Representative are, this tool provides an easy way to look it up based on your address: https://www.gis.lcc.mn.gov/ iMaps/districts/

2. Get to know your state legislators

Familiarize yourself with your legislators and where they stand on key issues. Your legislators' contact information is easy to find using the website above. Reach out to them with an email or phone call asking what bills they are already thinking about for this upcoming session, what committees they are on, and if they chair any committees.

3. Learn to talk about housing issues

Develop your own 'elevator pitch' to share with your legislators on why you care about housing issues. Spend a few minutes thinking about your "why"- what got you interested in homelessness and housing, what grounds you in this work (maybe through your faith tradition), and what are the most important values you hold around housing?

4. Learn about proposed legislation

Learn about the proposed constitutional amendment for housing. This proposed legislation would put a constitutional amendment on the ballot which, if passed, would make significant, dedicated, ongoing investments in housing opportunities across the spectrum to serve the needs of people experiencing homelessness and housing instability (including youth experiencing homelessness). Find out more below.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment for Housing

Align and Street Voices of Change have signed on to endorse the campaign for a Constitutional Amendment for Housing, which would create a dedicated source of funding for housing through a Constitutional Amendment. This initiative comes out of recognition that as a state we have significantly underinvested in housing.

Why a Constitutional Amendment?

"Because we need to ensure the state is making the investments required to truly address our current housing crisis."

What would this legislation do?

It would put a question on the ballot in 2024 to ask voters to decide to amend our State Constitution to create 3 specific funds for housing- Homeownership Fund, Rental Opportunity Fund, and Household & Community Stability Fund.

What are the guiding principles of this campaign?

"Our campaign principles include race equity, sustainability and climate resilience, uplifting rural voices, accessibility, and ensuring frontline leaders and grassroots groups are decision-makers and campaign leaders."

Practicing the Examen with prayer-filled presence and descernment

ent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14 and thus begins our journey toward Holy Week and beyond. For centuries, Christians have marked the season of Lent by adopting and engaging in some new kind of spiritual practice; a practice that reminds us of our humanness and our mortality. For some, it's giving up things like chocolate, wine, or curse words. Many give up eating meat or another self-sacrificing human endeavor. As Lutherans, our piety does not ask us to

"give something up;" we are drawn toward the opportunity to learn and encounter something new or different.

This year, in addition to daily devotions and a Sunday morning study of the Psalms, the pastors will invite you to learn about the daily practice of the Examen.

This invitation comes to you as just that – an invitation. It comes without expectation or anticipated outcomes. The Examen is simply a



Who is Ignatius of Loyola?

Born in 1491, Ignatius (born Iñigo Lopez de Loyola) of Loyola was the youngest of 13 children to wealthy noble parents in Spain. In 1517, he became

a knight in service to one of his relatives. While defending a citadel in Pamplona in 1521, he was hit by cannonball in his legs, ending his military career.

During his treatment and recovery for his injuries, he did a lot of reading about Jesus and the Saints. He felt called to the priesthood and began his many years of training, during which time he was repeatedly in trouble with and questioned by religious authorities in Spain and France, traveled to Palestine, and spent a year living as a beggar in Manresa.

Loyola was ordained into the priesthood in 1537. In 1539, he and a group of his companions formed a new order called the Jesuit Order or the "Society of Jesus," which Pope Paul III approved in 1540. Loyola was chosen for the office of general of the new, allmale order.

Ignatius of Loyola developed and composed the *Spiritual Exercises*, a book meant to guide people toward following Jesus. His daily prayer practices (what we call the Examen) were later added to this publication.

Loyola died in 1556, still holding the office of general for the Jesuit order. He was beatified by Pope Paul V in 1609 and canonized as a saint by Pope Gregory XV in 1622.

Though the Jesuit Order was nearly abolished in the 1700's, they have grown to be the largest male order of the Catholic religious community. Pope Francis was the first Jesuit to be elected pope in 2013.

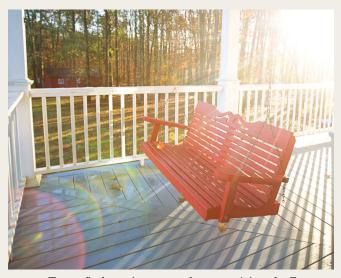

So why the Examen?

In a culture that rarely invites us to slow down for anything, the Examen calls for us to stop, to experience a moment of sabbath, rest and reflection. What a gift. The Examen is a five-step practice that encourages us to intentionally slow down and center ourselves on five unique thoughts or ideas for the day. These include:

- 1. Ask God for light/illumination
- 2. Give thanks
- 3. Review the day
- 4. Face your shortcomings/limitations
- 5. Look forward to the day to come



Try to find a quiet space when practicing the Examen.

Each week, one of these elements will be the topic and focus of our Wednesday services and learning. As we get ready to learn about the Examen together, here are a few things you may want to know about this time-honored practice:

Set Time Aside

It's best to set a specific time and place for your prayer. This will encourage a cadence that will draw you toward God each day.

Find the Quiet

A quiet space, free of distractions and noise is best.



The Examen is a daily prayer practice, so find a routine time each day to pray.

Connection to Community

Remembering that Christians have practiced the Examen for centuries invites you to a community practiced and shared by thousands.

The beauty of this practice is that it encourages a daily time with God that is structured and contemplative. God longs to be in relationship with you, and one of the ways we do this is through daily contact with God.

We look forward to sharing the Examen with you as we journey through Lent.

You can practice the Examen with Central's Pastors on Wednesday nights at 6 p.m. during Lent (February 21-March 20).

Contemplative Prayer in Lent

This year the journey of Lent is shaped by St. Ignatius' prayer practice, the Examen. St. Ignatius of Loyola encouraged prayer-filled mindfulness. He offered what is called the Daily Examen. The Examen is a technique of prayerful contemplation on the events of the day to listen for God's presence and to discern God's direction for

us. There are many versions of the prayer. Jesuit training follows 5 invitations: ask God for light/illumination, give thanks, review the day/the moment, face your shortcomings/limitations, and look forward to the day to come in hope.

Each week in the season of Lent we will highlight one of these invitations as we enter the prayer practice of Examen. Lenten midweek worship at noon or evening contemplative prayer at 6 p.m. will help ground us as we prayerfully tend to mindfulness and listen for God. The prayer labyrinth will be set up for you to explore before or after worship on the weekend of February 17-18, 24-25, and March 9-10, 23-24. It will also be available before and after worship on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. The prayer area will have two Examen

based prayer stations for you before and after all Lenten worship services.

Holy Week and Easter Sunday

Holy Week begins with Jesus' triumphant Palm Sunday entrance into Jerusalem. The worship during Holy Week leads us to the Last Supper, foot washing, Good Friday's cross, the Easter Vigil, and the joy of Easter Sunday. You are invited to each of these essential worship services as you tend the invitation to ask for illumination, give thanks, review the day, face shortcomings and limitations, and look forward in hope.

Annual Meeting Highlights

The congregation met for the annual meeting on Sunday, February 11 at noon. President Jeff Block called the meeting to order. Written and verbal reports were shared, celebrating the ministry and mission of the congregation. Updates were shared on the Casavant organ design work and the search for the half-time choir director. The 2023 financial reports and 2024 proposed budget were presented by Treasurer Karl Starr. The budget was adopted. The nominating committee report was shared, and the congregation voted to elect new council leaders, renew current council leader's terms, and elect members to serve on the audit and nominating committees and for the Synod Assembly. The meeting ended with deep gratitude for all who serve, sharing their time and abilities, specifically Jeff Block for serving as the president these past two years and Rod Richter who has served on the council for the past four years.

The hope is that we can secure a new choir director by this summer. We continue to be grateful for Joe Osowski as he serves as the interim choir director!

Casavant Organ Updates

The Casavant organ design process is off to a good start. We approved a design contract with Richards, Fowkes, and Company last November and design work began this year, including a site-visit February 6-8. We expect the design process to take 12 months. Meanwhile, we will continue to offer opportunities to learn about the project.

The morning of January 21, the organ gave us a rather unwelcome, but not surprising, reminder that it needs help. The previous week had averaged 10% relative humidity in the sanctuary, and that dryness had caused the separated glue joints to open up. For the morning's service, several of the organ's sounds weren't heard, but we also had a pipe which made noise when it was not supposed to. Going forward, we expect similar behavior during periods of prolonged dryness.

For now, the organ remains viable in all but the driest conditions. This allows us the time for a thorough and complete design and construction process. In the meantime, we will have some days that require workarounds, and others that require a quick jump to the piano.

Recognizing this valued Lutheran rite of passage

There is something about Confirmation that sets a unique and lasting transition in motion for our children.

In youth ministry, we mark milestones in each child's journey when we baptize, present Bibles, teach the Lord's Prayer, and

invite the little ones to take their First Communion. Each of these milestones is practiced in community with other children and families at the same developmental stage. There is a beautiful spirit and energy

that pours out of each landmark moment, marking the passage of time and the beautiful knowing and growing of the children.

By the time kids reach confirmation age, they are well into their teens, and they are developing their own ideas and beliefs. Some are open and some are more reserved but the fact that the community (the church) stops to recognize and celebrate this milestone has

more meaning to these teens than they will ever disclose.

Each April, we ask the students to pause and reflect on their faith formation. Each writes a

Faith Statement or creates a Faith Expression that helps them embody and articulate what their faith means. The opportunity to ask questions, to express themselves, and to be heard and seen as forming adults is a holy and sacred moment for the kids and they recognize it in ways that are indescribable.

In the coming weeks, the 7th and 8th grade students will be meeting with Confirmation mentors as they prepare to be confirmed this spring or next. Each is preparing to cross the first of many thresholds, transitions that take them from childhood to adulthood. Keep these remarkable young people in your prayers this season.
