But Jacob said, "I will not let you go, unless you bless me." ²⁷ So he said to him, "What is your name?" And he said, "Jacob." 28 Then the man said, "You shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with humans and have prevailed." ²⁹ Then Jacob asked him, "Please tell me your name." But he said, "Why is it that you ask my name?" And there he blessed him. 30 So Jacob called the place Peniel, saying, "For I have seen God face to face, yet my life is preserved." ³¹ The sun rose upon him as he passed Penuel, limping because of his hip.



⁺The origins of the song and lyrics are unclear, possibly evolving from other songs of the time. The song first appeared as "We'll Overcome" in 1945, during a labor strike against American Tobacco in Charleston, South Carolina. In the 1960s, the song served as a rallying cry for the civil rights movement.

In the last hundred years, "We Shall Overcome" has become known as a protest song in many parts of the world, including China, Lebanon, and parts of Eastern Europe. In Bangladesh and Bengali speaking parts of India, two versions of the song were popularized: one by folk singer Hemanga Biswas, and one recorded by the Calcutta Youth Choir during 1971 during the Bangladesh War of *Independence. To this day it is* regularly sung at public events in Bangladesh.


