Children are welcome and celebrated in worship. During Children's Time, the children receive a Christmas Eve activity along with a glow stick to hold in place of a real candle during Silent Night. Many families sit near the children's tables next to the baptismal font, but you are welcome to sit anywhere in the sanctuary.



All are welcome to receive communion at Central. At the ushers' invitation, you will proceed toward the altar where there are regular and gluten-free wafers served with wine or grape juice. Your server will offer bread and wine for all, including children. If you prefer that your child receive a blessing rather than communion, please let your server know.

Jean Langlais (1907-1991) was an influential French composer and organist. Blind from 2 years old, he attended school at the National Institute for Blind Children in Paris, where he began his organ studies and would later return to teach. He continued his studies at the Paris Conservatoire. He was the Titular Organist of Sainte-Clotilde, following in the footsteps of César Franck and Charles Tournemire.

“The Nativity” is a tone poem, meaning that the music seeks to evoke a scene or narrative.

In this case, the music is in four distinct sections, each focusing on different subjects: the creche, the angels, the shepherds, and the holy family.

The composer writes the following program (translated from French):

“In a humble manger, on a gentle night, Mary and Joseph wait for the birth of Christ the Lord. The child being born, the heavenly host, in a gracious apparition, announces to the shepherds the event in Bethlehem. The shepherds, having come to the manger, offer their most tender melodies to the infant Jesus as a sign of adoration. Then, the holy family finds calm in the peace of the Savior.”

Luke 2:1-20

The Holy Gospel according to Luke.

Glory to you, O Lord.

¹In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. ²This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. ³All went to their own towns to be registered. ⁴Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. ⁵He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. ⁶While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. ⁷And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

⁸In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. ⁹Then an angel of the Lord stood before them,



and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified.

¹⁰But the angel said to them, “Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: ¹¹to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. ¹²This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger.” ¹³And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying,

¹⁴“Glory to God in the highest heaven,
and on earth peace among those whom he favors!”

¹⁵When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, “Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us.” ¹⁶So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. ¹⁷When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; ¹⁸and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. ¹⁹But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. ²⁰The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

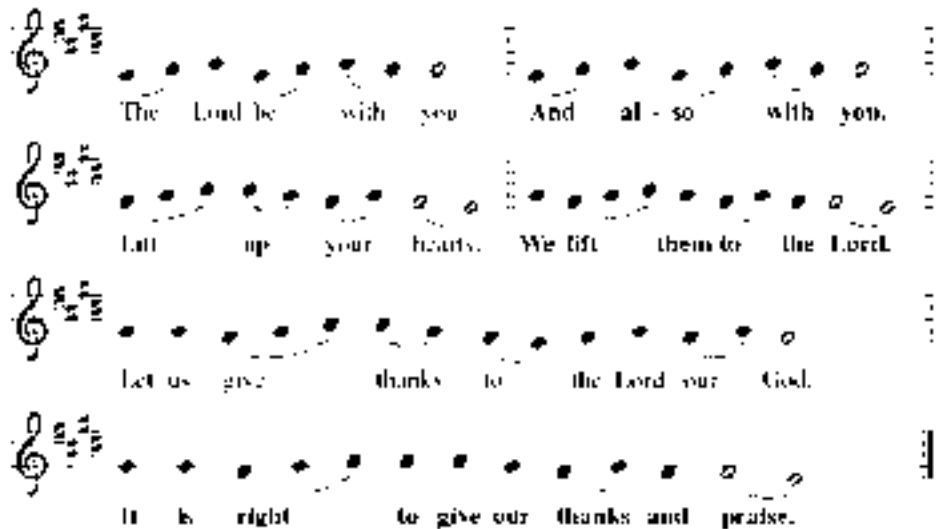
