Generosity Begins at Home

The promise that our home is in God grounds us. In the ups and downs, we have experienced in our personal and communal lives, the stories of our home in God provide hope and inspiration. The Gospel of John rings with the promise of home. In chapter 14, Jesus offers these famous and comforting words: “Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God; believe also in me. In my Father’s house are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you?” Jesus prepares a place for you, each moment of every day. One of the gifts of faith is the mindfulness that God provides, a divine abundance that begins with each breath we breathe.

If we pause to consider how the promise of home and generosity are connected, the first thought may be that generous lives are lived in the big gestures like charity events, capital appeals, or emergency donations when disaster strikes. There is an important place for these acts of gratitude. At the same time, generous lives are most often lived in the daily moments that define home, work, church communities, and neighborhoods. We may remember the big donation by a wealthy philanthropist who is acknowledged at the beginning of our favorite PBS show. We certainly remember the neighbor who brought over cookies when our loved one had died. The small acts of generosity have the power to create a sense of home, a grounding in love.

At home, generosity is a faithful response. It is a way of life shaped in relationship with an abundant God who prepares a place for us each day.

A generosity that begins at home might look like an exhausted parent rising in the middle of the night to comfort a child, family members forgiving one another instead of holding grudges, and neighbors seeing beyond the surface divisions to a shared humanity. These daily acts of generosity teach us the ways of trust and love. They open us to be the followers of Jesus, who in John 14 reminds us that he is the “way, the truth and the life.” At home in Jesus, we embody all he provides as we give thanks and live generous lives.

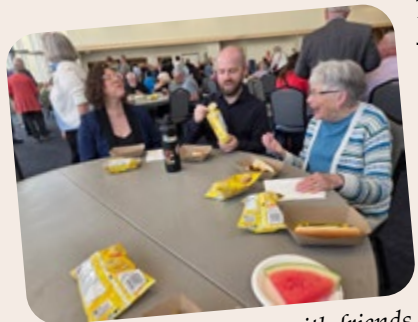
New Member Happy Hour Moves to the Fall

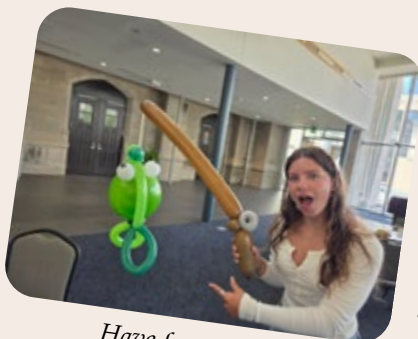

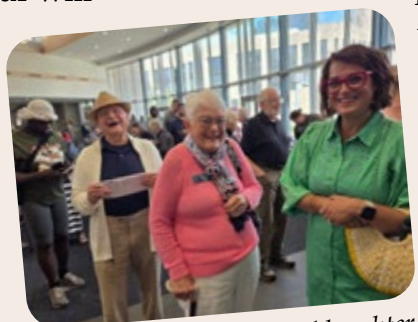

Sanctuary Renewal Project Updates

The Sanctuary Renewal Project work continues in 2026! The Sanctuary Renewal Project budget has been updated by Jorgenson Construction for the remodeling of the sacristy, the new ADA ramp, and altar work. The updated bids are within the "not-to-exceed" budget approved by the congregation at the special congregational meeting in April 2025. The Fiscal and Property Committee and the Congregation Council, along with affirmation by the Sanctuary Renewal Committee, have affirmed the updated bids.

Jorgenson Construction will place the order for the materials and once those are available the work will begin. When we have a firm timeline, an informational meeting will be offered to update you on the projects and the scope of the work. Leadership Begins at Home

Central's Congregation Council works with members, volunteers, and staff to imagine and implement the church's mission, vision, and goals.

It is both humbling and a true honor to serve as Central's newly elected Congregation Council President. When I first walked through these doors nearly 30 years ago, I never imagined I would one day step into this role. I am deeply grateful for the faithful leadership that has come before me and I remain committed to carrying that legacy forward.

Over those 30 years, a lot has changed, including parts of our physical space. But what has remained constant is something much more important: the generosity of this congregation and the genuine desire to be in community with one another. Central has always been a place where people show up, for each other, for our neighbors, and for the wider world. That continues to be our story of home.

In recent months, the council has focused on strengthening our shared ministry through active support of three key task forces: Mental Health and Wholeness, Seasons of Life, and Information, Connection, and Communication (ICC). These groups are making meaningful impact, creating space for connection, walking alongside those navigating life's challenges, and strengthening how we communicate and engage as a congregation.

In addition, the council recently approved the distribution of year-end funds to both facility care and emergency rental assistance, reflecting our commitment to both stewardship and care for our neighbors.

We are also looking ahead with excitement as we move forward with sanctuary renewal projects, including accessibility improvements, and the next steps in the restoration of the Casavant organ. These are more than building projects, they are investments in the future of worship, music, and community life at Central.

The Congregation Council is also committing to a deeper focus on leadership and connection. We are creating intentional space to listen, ask questions, and grow in our understanding of Central's ministries and the people who make them possible. Our goal is to lead not just through decisions, but through strong relationships, staying curious, engaged, and closely connected as we continue building a place where all are welcome, no exceptions.

I ask for your prayers as we continue this work—prayers for wisdom, for discernment, and for the continued strength of this community.

Generosity and Home:

Creativity, Community, and Care of Quilters and Knitters

When you think of home, what do you imagine? For many people, “home” is much more than only a dwelling place. It is a place of comfort, safety, and relationship with loved ones.

This year at Central, we have learned, shared, worshipped, and been in community together under the theme “Stories of Home.” As we wrap up the program year, we reflect on all the ways of “home” that we have practiced and discussed, including the ways of generosity.

There are two groups at Central where creativity and craft intersect with generosity and a sense of home: the Prayer Shawl Knitters and the Quilters for Lutheran World Relief (LWR).

Our Restoration Center and Hospitality Coordinator, Karen Knox, has worked at Central for almost 28 years and has witnessed countless quilts and prayer shawls go out the doors for the benefit of those in need of “comfort and support.” She says that both groups are “Much like home. They gather once a month, they talk, they pray, they share stories, and most times they share treats or a meal.”

Though both groups have different outputs (shawls vs. quilts), the foundational elements

of how and why they operate are similar. They are artists and creators, in community with one another, acting out of a generosity of spirit.

The quilting page of the LWR website reads: “Often, when natural disasters strike or war drives families from their homes, our hearts ache with compassion but we don’t know how to help... Making Lutheran World Relief Mission Quilts is a tangible way to express love to our neighbors in need.”

Carol Henderson, long-time Central member and quilter, expressed her feelings about the work of quilting: “I love the art of creating something special for someone.” Both quilts and prayer shawls are a creative process, and each creator leaves a piece

of themselves in the final product. The unique look, the comforting textures, and the care and love instilled in each quilt and shawl comes from these creators.

Creativity, skill, and the resulting product are the part of this work that makes it tangible; you can hold a completed quilt or shawl in your hands and give it as a gift. But what about the intangible elements of this process?

Across the board, participants in these groups expressed a great joy in doing the work together.

Deanne Tibben, another Central member and quilter says that, "My favorite thing is looking forward to meeting with some friends that I would never have had an occasion to be with..."

Joy Erickson is a fairly new member of Central and has "found friends and a comfy, home-like experience" when she joined the Prayer Shawl Knitters. "Now I can be in a group, in the lower level of the church, making friends, while creating prayer shawls for people," she says.

In her article *The Power of Creative Community: Why We're Better Together*, artist and educator, Anne LaFollette asserts that "creative community reminds you that your work matters – not just to you, but to others."

This couldn't be truer for these groups at Central. For Henderson, it is the generosity piece, along with the sense of community, that brings her back to this work. "I love being a part of the quilters because we share stories and ideas of how we help others with our love of doing for families in need," she states.

Tibben remarks that, "The feeling of home is a result of belonging to a group of people

who feel a need to help others less fortunate."

Similarly, Erickson expresses a joy in "creating prayer shawls for people

who are hurting and need comfort."

Knitting (and crocheting) and quilting are different mediums, but both facilitate a sense of home in the circles where they are created and, in the places where they end up. Knox emphasizes that both the process and the creation are rooted in God's love. "God's work, made with these hands, is then transformed into a garment of love that warms and comforts and creates a

relationship between the doers and the receivers."

Both groups are excited to welcome all skill levels, everyone from beginners to experienced crafters, and will offer teaching and support to anyone wanting to give it a try. The Quilters generally meet on the first Wednesday and

Thursday of each month, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. And the Prayer Shawl Knitters meet on the third Wednesday each month from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. You're invited to come and see how you might contribute to this creative and generous community of people.

Also, if you or a person you know would be comforted by a prayer shawl, you are welcome to take one from the ladder near the baptismal font.

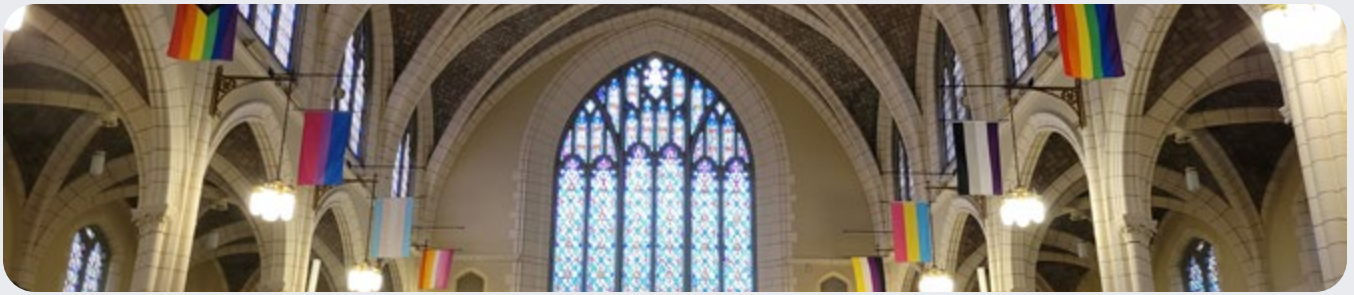

MCC is an inclusive LGBTQ+ community, with 92% of their singers identifying as queer in 2025.

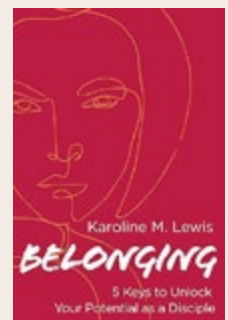
Summer is a chance to slow down with some contemplative learning.

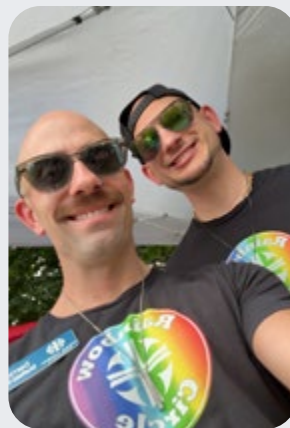

Align Spring Campaign

This spring and summer we are focusing on how to prevent people from experiencing homelessness. From the Align Spring Campaign Guide:

Preventing homelessness from occurring is a critical part of addressing homelessness. Nearly half (47%) of renters in Minnesota are cost burdened, meaning they pay more than 30% of their income on rent and utilities. With limited income and rising costs, it's not surprising that even a small financial crisis can lead to getting behind on rent and facing eviction. Homelessness Prevention not only stabilizes households in a moment of crisis, but mitigates potential domino effects of the trauma of facing housing court, having a court-ordered eviction, and not being able to find other housing due to having an eviction on record, as well as mitigating the cost and increased use of shelter and services.
